Mountain View Landfill aka. Blandfill Landfill

Mountain View Landfill (previously known as Blandfill Landfill) is approved as a Class VI unlined inert construction and demolition (C&D) landfill that includes a portion of the site as a Class V Asbestos Mono-fill. The site is owned and operated by Mountain View Landfill, Inc. (MLI), a subsidiary of Waste Management of Utah, Inc. The landfill is located in Salt Lake County, Utah. The governing bodies having jurisdiction are both the Salt Lake Valley Health Department and the Utah Department of Environmental Quality.

Groundwater Monitoring

Monitoring is conducted under the 2001 "Groundwater Monitoring Plan, Mountain View Landfill, Salt Lake City, Utah" (GMP), as approved by the Salt Lake Valley Health Department (SLVHD). The GMP satisfies requirements of SLVHD "Health Regulation #1, Solid Waste Management and Permitting, Section 6.7, Groundwater and Surface Water Monitoring Requirements." The regulation specifies that groundwater monitoring be conducted annually at construction and demolition (C&D) landfills. The GMP describes permanent monitoring elements to provide environmental protection during and after the active life of the landfill. Groundwater sampling, sampling methods, data evaluation, data quality assurance/quality control (QA/QC), chemical analyses, and statistical analyses are conducted in accordance with the GMP and the MVLF operating permit. MVLF has five groundwater monitoring wells: three are up-gradient and two are down-gradient. An annual Groundwater Monitoring report, including field and laboratory analytical data, is submitted to two agencies: SLVHD and the Utah Department of Environmental Quality (UDEQ). The reports are available to the public and also retained in the MVLF operating records. Groundwater is analyzed for a parameter list developed and approved by SLVHD based on a comprehensive database of analytical results since 1986. The parameter list consists of 27 inorganic parameters (metals and water-quality indicators) and 48 volatile organic compounds (VOCs). To date, there is no history of a release affecting groundwater attributed to MVLF.

Site security is ensured by cameras and an alarm system with access to the facility through the gatehouse. During business hours, all traffic is directed to a gatehouse occupied by trained personnel. During non-business hours the gate is locked and monitored by 24-hour electronic surveillance.

Approval Process

Waste Management has a defined waste screening protocol for each of its non-hazardous waste facilities, which protects employees and the environment. For industrial and special waste streams, the generator or agent must complete a waste profile for review by our technical staff. Waste profiles can be completed online at WMSolutions.com. Construction and demolition (C&D) debris is typically not required to be profiled for disposal.
